Loosely translated from the Welsh, there is deep meaning in the name of this wonderful place: "Garth" means Hearth or Home, "Newel" means New.



# Welcome

#### "Music is liquid architecture; architecture is frozen music" - Goethe

Music and architecture have always been sisters in art. The construction of a musical work, from its building bricks of "motifs" to the balance of its contrasting themes and sections, is the key to its unique artistic expression. Like an architect, composers can only achieve their intended effect by carefully manipulating and measuring the relationships of each musical element at their disposal. Like composers, architects start with a plan of the purpose, style, and effect of a building through careful consideration of the physical materials they've chosen. With both, the tools and the structures used are unique to the time and place of their creation, but the lineage of all that came before can be traced in every new composition and structure today.

This upcoming season, the campus of Garth Newel will undergo much needed structural improvements. The excitement of this naturally made us think of how Garth Newel's rebuilds in the past have spurred dynamic growth, such as converting a collapsed horse-riding ring with dirt floors to the concert venue now known as Herter Hall. We were inspired to explore the similar growth of musical forms and how compositional structures have changed or improved throughout time. You will see us exploring why some works are divided into movements and others are played without breaks, or the evolution of sonata form throughout time with our Sonata Evenings in the fall. Or how musical "suites" have changed, from the baroque dance suite to the Fantaisie Tableaux Tableaux suite of the romantic period. We will examine how musical structures were unique to different nations, such as the differences between British and Italian baroque structures that will be presented by the early music ensemble Three Notch'd Road. We will pit the "Chaconne" against the "Passacaglia" on New Year's Eve to really put to bed the question of "are they the same thing?"

Much like the magnificence of the world's greatest structures, our experience of great works of music is inexplicably more powerful than the construction of their parts. But understanding the logic behind a great work of art and marveling at its "bones" can only increase our enjoyment and appreciation of it. We're thrilled to have you along for this season's exploration and celebration of the "Construction of Music."

The Garth Newel Piano Quartet is known for their spirited and impassioned performances that offer enlivened interpretations of both standard and new repertoire. As artists-in-residence at Garth Newel Music Center, one of the premier and most active chamber music organizations in the United States, they program and perform over 50 concerts each year, engaging with audiences through conversational and interactive programs.

An active presence on the national and international stage, the Garth Newel Piano Quartet has performed throughout the United States and on five continents, at such prominent venues as Carnegie Hall, Strathmore Hall, The Chautauqua Institution, and the San Diego Chamber Music Workshop.

The quartet believes strongly in promoting creativity, and holds an annual competition for rising composers aimed at bolstering the piano quartet genre. They regularly commission and premiere music of their contemporaries, such as Pulitzer Prizewinner Paul Moravec, and David Biedenbender, for whom they received the 2017 Chamber Music America commissioning grant.



The Garth Newel Piano Quartet maintains a strong dedication to education and to nurturing the next generation of chamber musicians. They serve as faculty and directors for the Emerging Artist Fellowship Program, which gives talented collegeage musicians an opportunity to study and perform chamber music under the guidance of the Quartet and world-renowned guest musicians, and host an annual Amateur Chamber Music Workshop. Additionally, the Quartet has held guest artist residencies at universities and schools throughout the world, including the University of Michigan, Michigan State University, and West Virginia University.







Founded in 2010 as an integral part of Garth Newel Music Center's mission to share, explore and celebrate the infinite variety of chamber music in an intimate setting of natural beauty, the Allegheny Mountain String Project (AMSP) offers a comprehensive string music education program, including beginner and intermediate group classes, private lessons, and chamber music ensembles, to children of school age within driving distance of activities in Alleghany, Bath, and Highland Counties.

Group instruction for beginners is sponsored by our grant partners and offered at no cost for students in grades 3-7 in selected areas. Need-based scholarship assistance is available for all school-age students for private instruction.

AMSP students learn a wide variety of musical styles based on the guidelines of the American Music System, which include American & Appalachian folk songs and fiddle tunes for early instruction. Students learn to improvise and play by ear as well as to read music. They play Bach as well as bluegrass. Many students work through the Mark



O'Connor Method books, which provide historical context for each piece and bring American History to life in the music they play.

Scholarships and group classes are available through funding and in-kind support from the Alleghany Foundation, Virginia Hot Springs Preservation Trust, Clifton Forge School of the Arts, Bath County Arts Association, the Guilford Foundation, the Community Foundation of Central Blue Ridge, the Highland County Arts Council, Associated Chamber Music Players, Millboro Ruritan Club, the Bolar Ruritan Club and private donations. Activities take place at Garth Newel Music Center in Hot Springs, the Clifton Forge School of the Arts, the Highland Center in Monterey, First Presbyterian Church in Covington, and the Millboro Ruritan Club.

#### Fitz Gary, viola

In the summer of 2022, Fitz Gary joined the Garth Newel Piano Quartet as violist and Co-Artistic Director. Fitz, a native of Charlottesville, Virginia, has toured across the United States, Europe, and Asia performing in such venues as Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, London's Royal Albert Hall, and Japan's Suntory Hall. He completed his undergraduate studies at the Cleveland Institute of Music with Jeffrey Irvine, and graduate studies at The Juilliard School with Heidi Castleman and Hsin-Yun Huang. Selected as a 2013–2014 Fulbright Scholar, he studied with Barbara Westphal at the Musikhochschule in Lübeck, Germany. The school subsequently awarded him the DAAD prize for an outstanding international student, as well as his second master's degree. While in Germany, Fitz also performed with the GRAMMY<sup>™</sup> Award-winning NDR Sinfonieorchester (Elbphilharmonie) in Hamburg as a member of their Academy.

Fitz was a Clinician Ambassador for the string company D'Addario, and presented the "Strings 101" clinic to K-12 and college-level musicians in the Hampton Roads area,

sharing knowledge and advice on all things strings. He also served as the President of the Feldman Chamber Music Society in Norfolk, Virginia, affording him the opportunity to present great chamber ensembles to the community.

In 2012, Fitz started a project called Music Feeds Us, a chamber music series which ran for seven seasons. The concerts, which have been featured on *Performance Today*, raised over 220,000 meals for partner food banks in Virginia. Championing social awareness and hunger relief through string quartets was proof that classical music can inspire the power for good.

As an avid orchestral musician, Fitz has had the opportunity to perform with some of America's most prestigious ensembles, including the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, and the Washington National Opera at the Kennedy Center.

#### Isaac Melamed, cello

Cellist Isaac Melamed's musical endeavors connect him to some of the greatest musicians and artists of our time. As a member of the New Century Chamber Orchestra, Isaac has toured internationally to critical acclaim under music directors Nadja Salerno-Sonnenberg and Daniel Hope. Since joining the Garth Newel Piano Quartet in 2014, Isaac and the Quartet have performed throughout Croatia, Scotland, Italy, at the Chautauqua Institution, and around much of the United States. The Quartet programs and performs over 50 chamber music concerts each year and directs numerous educational programs at the historic Garth Newel Music Center in Hot Springs, Virginia.

A San Francisco native, Isaac studied with Grammy Award-winning cellist Antonio Lysy in Los Angeles, where he enjoyed solo engagements with the UCLA Philharmonia and Symphony Orchestras, and the Los Angeles Youth Orchestra. Isaac received graduate degrees from Manhattan School of Music, studying with Alan Stepansky and David Geber, as well as training from Dmitri Ferschtman at the Conservatorium van Amsterdam, Daniël Esser of the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra, and Steven Isserlis and Miklós Perényi at the Kronberg Academy in Germany. Isaac's cello was created for him in 2016 by Robert Brewer Young of Sentaraille a Berdot, France, on the model of the Marquis de Corberon Stradivari, 1726.

#### Jeannette Fang, piano

Jeannette Fang joined the Garth Newel Piano Quartet in 2015 as pianist and Co-Artistic Director. Praised for her imaginative and expressive performances, she has been featured at such prestigious venues as Alice Tully Hall, John F. Kennedy Center, Zankel Hall, Hill Auditorium, Peter J. Sharp Theater, Weill Recital Hall, and Steinway Hall, as well as appearing on stages in Europe and Asia.

Her awards include the Gold Medal at the 2013 Seattle International Piano Competition, where she also received the President's Award and Audience Favorite Prize. She has earned top prizes in the Dallas Chamber Symphony International Piano Competition and the MTNA Young Artist National Competition. She is the recipient of the Earl V. Moore Award and the Gottlieb Award, given by the University of Michigan, and the Elizabeth J. Parisot award from Yale School of Music; the winner of the Karlfried Nordman Scholarship Piano Competition at Juilliard; and was a National Presidential Scholar in the Arts in 2003.

Full of heart and soul, the music is inspired by the fearless musical offerings of the late '60s and early '70s. The band hails from Virginia Beach, Virginia, but has taken the show on the road, touring nationally and internationally, performing at venues of all sizes, and also has conducted masterclasses and workshops at numerous conservatories and schools around the world.

Jason Cale is originally from the deep south, with roots ranging from New Orleans to Mobile, Alabama. While spending 20 years as a professional musician performing all over the world with both the Army and Air Force Bands, he has worked diligently on his craft, producing albums and working/collaborating/touring with artists including Grace Potter, Melina Leon, John Popper, Sandra Bernhard, Joe Bonamassa, and many others. After retiring from the military in 2019 and gaining a deeper understanding of music, the music industry, and business, he's been blessed to find unity with his bandmates (two of whom are also retired military musicians), who are equally as passionate about their musical gifts. Out of this passion is how the Jason Cale Band was formed.

In addition to producing, performing and writing music, Jason spends multiple days a week teaching music and guitar to students ranging from ages 6 to 81. This is a position that Jason honors with great esteem and gratitude. His students can even be found gracing the stages of Jason's performances from time to time.

Evelyn Grau, violin, enjoyed a wonderful and long performing career at Garth Newel Music Center, spanning the years 1983–2021. Although now officially retired from the Music Center, she remains devoted to all things Garth Newel and is thrilled to be returning for a concert weekend this summer.



Evelyn holds degrees from Yale University and Peabody College at Vanderbilt, with further studies at the University of Michigan and at Academia Musicale Chigiana in Siena, Italy. Her teachers have included Raphael Hillyer, Bruno Giuranna, Jean Dane, Paul Makanowitzky, and Russell Gerhart. She has performed worldwide as a chamber musician with the Garth Newel Piano Quartet, the Garth Newel Chamber Players, the Atlanta Virtuosi and various other chamber ensembles, and has served on the faculties of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire and Western Michigan University.



Wanchi Huang, violin, studied both piano and violin as a child in her native Taiwan. Though she had won several youth piano competitions as a child, she opted to concentrate on the violin "because I could take the violin anywhere I wanted." She chose well.

At just age 14, she made her solo debut with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Catherine Comet. Huang is currently Professor of Violin at James Madison University School of Music and contributes to the community as concertmaster of the Waynesboro Symphony. Her previous albums include those devoted to the complete Sonatas of Eugène Ysaÿe, to the Partitas and Sonatas of J.S. Bach for unaccompanied violin, and to music by William Walton and Benjamin Britten in a collaboration with longtime

friend and pianist Robert Koenig. These are on the Centaur Records label and have all received excellent reviews. Her most recent album, Imagining Worlds: Music for Solo Violin by living composers, was released by Parma Music in January 2024.

Her primary violin is the ex-Vieuxtemps Claude Pierray (1720 Paris).



Qing Jiang, piano

As a concerto soloist, Qing has appeared with the Britten-Pears Orchestra and maestro Oliver Knussen, as well as with the Lanzhou Symphony and conductor Zushan Bian. Passionate about chamber music, she has collaborated with Itzhak Perlman, Natalie Clein, Joel Krosnick, and Anthony Marwood, as well as with the Laurie Smukler, Natasha Brofsky, and Roger Tapping. Qing also has longstanding relationships with Yellow

Juilliard, Shanghai, Jasper, Aeolus, and Parker quartets. In 2016, she performed on a six-city China tour with Barn, Kneisel Hall, the Aldeburgh Festival, and Interlochen, where she has been frequently featured as guest artist and mentor. Other festival appearances include Music@Menlo, Ravinia's Steans Institute, the Perlman Music Program, Garth Newel Music Center, and the Aspen festival, where she was a winner of the concerto competition. Versatile in style and interests, Qing has performed with the Britten-Pears contemporary ensemble, the Juilliard contemporary ensemble, and the Aspen percussion ensemble. She's worked closely with composers Jennifer Higdon, Jörg Widmann, Brett Dean, Juri Seo, and Eric Nathan to prepare performances of their work, and her 2022 solo album Dreamed Landscapes (Albany) features works by Thomas Adès and Daniel Temkin.

Starting piano at age 3 with her mother, Qing's principal teachers include Caio Pagano, Robert McDonald, Wha-kyung Byun and Patricia Zander. As the first Chinese recipient of the Jack Kent Cooke Arts Scholarship, she holds degrees from Arizona State University, the Juilliard School, and the New England Conservatory. She is currently an Associate Professor of Music at Bucknell University, and on the faculty of Kneisel Hall Chamber Music School and Festival. (gingjiangpiano.com)

Ingrid Keller, piano, is the Founding Artistic Director of the Belvedere Series. She holds a multifaceted career as a recitalist, collaborative pianist, and teacher, with performances hailed as "having graceful power...a revelation in musical excellence" (Oakwood Register) and an "unforgettable experience" (Berkshire Gazette). Her album, in collaboration with tenor Jason Vest, Evening Hours, songs of Richard Hundley, was released through Roven Records in 2018. Ingrid earned a doctorate from Indiana University where she studied under the tutelage of world-renowned pianist Menahem Pressler.

Fiona Hughes, violin and Artistic Director of Three Notch'd Road, holds degrees from Oberlin Conservatory and Cleveland Institute of Music. She is a versatile performer of both modern and baroque violin, appearing with Apollo's Fire, Washington Bach Consort, Bach Akademie Charlotte, Boston Baroque, and the Richmond Symphony. Fiona has performed in numerous music festivals, including Kinhaven, Encore, Brevard Music Center, National Repertory Orchestra, Banff (Canada), Staunton Music Festival, and Pacific

She has also performed with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Melbourne Symphony, the Kansas City Symphony, the Cincinnati Symphony, the Lexington Philharmonic, the New World Symphony, and the Tasmanian Symphony. A dedicated new music advocate, she has performed dozens of premieres of commissions, including works by Nathalie Joachim, Brett Dean, Nico Muhly, Bryce Dessner, Amy Beth Kirsten, David Lang, Andy Akiho, David T. Little, the collective Sleeping Giant, and the duo Flutronix. Her debut solo album Watch Over Us features works for solo violin and electronics by Nathalie Joachim, Missy

Mazzoli, Kate Moore, Katherine Balch, Eve Beglarian, and Anna Clyne.

Prior to joining Eighth Blackbird, Yvonne served three seasons as Assistant Concertmaster of the Washington National Opera Orchestra and as Associate Concertmaster of the Cabrillo Festival Orchestra. An avid chamber musician, she toured the east coast with Musicians from Marlboro and has performed at Marlboro Music Festival, Music from Angel Fire, Ravinia Music Festival, Twickenham Fest, Taos Music Festival, and Yellow Barn Music Festival. She has also appeared as soloist with such renowned orchestras as the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra and the Auckland Philharmonia. Winner of the silver medal at the 2005 Michael Hill World Violin Competition, Yvonne has also garnered top prizes at the Liana Issakadze International Competition and the Holland-America Music Society Competition. She won the grand prize at the Pasadena Instrumental Competition and first prize at the Bronislaw Kaper Awards, the Arts and Talent Recognition Search festival (sponsored by the National Foundation for the Advancement in the Arts), and the Donna Reed Foundation Competition. Furthermore, she won prizes for the Best Performance of a Commissioned Work at the Irving M. Klein International String Competition and at the Michael Hill World Violin Competition.

Yvonne is on faculty at Michigan State University, where she teaches violin performance and leads the chamber music program. She also teaches at the Atlantic Music Festival and has given lessons, masterclasses and lectures at universities throughout the US in addition to long-term residency activities at the Curtis Institute of Music, the University of Chicago, and the University of Richmond.

#### Genevieve Feiwen Lee, piano

A versatile performer of music spanning five centuries, GRAMMY™-nominated Genevieve Feiwen Lee has thrilled audiences on the piano, harpsichord, toy piano, keyboard, and electronics. She enjoys music that challenges her to go outside of her comfort zone to sing, speak, act, and play new instruments. As a soloist she has appeared in France, Brazil, Bulgaria, China, Poland, and the Netherlands. She has given solo recitals at Merkin Concert Hall, NY, and the Salle Gaveau in Paris. Since her first concerto engagement at age 12, she has appeared with the São Paulo State Symphony Orchestra, Brazil; the Vrazta State Philharmonic, Bulgaria; and The Orchestra of Northern New York. Her concerts in China appeared on Hunan State Television, and her performance from the Spiegelzaal at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam was broadcast on live radio.



Ms. Lee was nominated in the Best Chamber Music Performance category at the 58th GRAMMY™ Awards for the recording of Tom Flaherty's Airdancing and she can be heard on Innova, Albany, Reference, and New Focus Recordings. In the Los Angeles area, Ms. Lee has been a guest performer with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Chamber Music series at Disney Hall, Piano Spheres, Southwest Chamber Music, Jacaranda, and the Hear Now New Music Festival. She's a founding member of the Mojave Trio and performed in



Carnegie Hall with the Garth Newel Piano Quartet. Ms. Lee received her degrees from the Peabody Institute, École Normale de Musique de Paris, and the Yale School of Music. She is Professor of Music at Pomona College, California.

Geoffrey Marsh has been performing all over the world for the last 15 years with his unique circus stunts and zany marionette puppets at schools, family festivals, and Renaissance fairs. In addition to his yearly shows, Geoffrey volunteers with "Clowns Without Borders," a non-profit organization that offers laughter in hospitals, refugee camps, crisis areas, disaster zones, migrant camps, neighborhoods, and schools of extreme poverty.



Maureen Nelson, violin, joined the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra after leading the GRAMMY<sup>TM</sup>nominated Ensō String Quartet for over a decade, captivating audiences from major concert stages of the world, regularly concertizing throughout North America and abroad. Founded at Yale University, the guartet has been described by Strad magazine as "thrilling" and praised by the Washington Post for its "glorious sonorities...half honey, half molten lava." The guartet guickly went on to win top prizes at the Concert Artists Guild competition and the Banff International String Quartet Competition. Her final season with the guartet included performances at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Kennedy Center and Library of Congress, as well as extensive tours of Australia, New Zealand, Colombia and Brazil. Additionally, Maureen has held teaching residencies at Tanglewood, Interlochen and Rice University and collaborated with the UK-based organization Music for Autism. For their dedication to outreach in the community, the guartet received the Guarneri String Quartet Award from Chamber Music America. Along with a busy touring and teaching schedule, Maureen made numerous critically acclaimed recordings including the Grammy nominated Complete String Quartets of Alberto Ginastera. She has spent her summers performing at numerous festivals, including Festival d'Aix en Provence, Prussia Cove, Madeline Island, Campos do Jordão International Festival, SummerFest La Jolla, San Miguel de Allende International Chamber Music Festival, and Festival Mosaic.

A native of Pennsylvania, Maureen was enrolled in Temple University's Center for Gifted Young Musicians at the age of 12, and began attending the Curtis Institute of Music shortly thereafter. As a winner of the Greenfield Competition, Maureen appeared as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra when she was 16. While studying in Germany, she was concertmaster of the Detmolder Kammerochester. Currently, Maureen is also a member of the Houston-based chamber orchestra ROCO and New York's Festival Orchestra of Lincoln Center.

#### Parker Quartet

Daniel Chong, violin; Ken Hamao, violin; Jessica Bodner, viola; Kee-Hyun Kim, cello Inspiring performances, luminous sound, and exceptional musicianship are the hallmarks of the GRAMMY™ winning Parker Quartet. Renowned for its dynamic interpretations and polished, expansive colors, the group has rapidly distinguished itself as one of the preeminent ensembles of its generation, dedicated purely to the sound and depth of their music. The Quartet has appeared at the world's most important venues since its founding in 2002.

The Parker Quartet is now in its seventh year as faculty members of Harvard University's Department of Music in the group's role as Blodgett Artists-in-Residence. Recent seasons included performances and residencies around the United States and Europe, including at the University of Iowa, the University of Chicago, the Wigmore Hall, the University of South Carolina, the Schubert Club, Skidmore College, and Kansas City's Friends of Chamber Music.

Founded and currently based in Boston, the Parker Quartet's numerous honors include winning the Concert Artists Guild Competition, the Grand Prix and Mozart Prize at France's Bordeaux International String Quartet Competition, and Chamber Music America's prestigious Cleveland Quartet Award. Now Blodgett Artists-in-Residence at Harvard University's Department of Music, and also in residence at the UofSC School of Music, the Quartet's numerous residencies have included serving as artists-in-residence at the University of St. Thomas (2012-2014), Quartet-in-Residence at the University of Minnesota (2011–2012), Quartet-in-Residence with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra (2008–2010), and as the first-ever Artists-in-Residence with Minnesota Public Radio (2009-2010).



Christa Patton, barogue harp and early wind specialist, has performed throughout the Americas, Europe, and Japan with many of today's premier early music ensembles. As a multi-instrumentalist she has appeared with the Boston Camerata, Apollo's Fire, The King's Noyse, Newberry Consort, Toronto Consort, La Nef, Blue Heron, Folger Consort, Parthenia, ARTEK, Pegasus, New York State Baroque Orchestra, Piffaro the Renaissance band and many others. As a Baroque harpist, she has performed in early opera productions with the New York City Opera, Wolf Trap Opera, Opera Atelier, Opera Omnia and the Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, to name a few. Young lives in Maryland with her husband, the bassist Anthony Manzo, two teenagers and two cats.

Francis Yun, harpsichord, began playing the harpsichord while still a serious student of piano. He soon became enamored with the expressive capabilities of the harpsichord and became passionate about the music of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. He has performed throughout the United States in both solo and chamber recitals and has served as a continuo player for many orchestras, including The New York Strings Orchestra, Apollo's Fire, and Juilliard415. He has been a concerto soloist with the Garth Newel Emerging Artist Orchestra, and Juilliard415.

Dr. Yun is a strong advocate for new music written for the harpsichord. He has commissioned several new works for the instrument and has also appeared as soloist with the University of Michigan Symphony Orchestra where he premiered a new harpsichord concerto.

#### Roberto Sansuini, composer

Born in Parma, he attended the Conservatory of his hometown, graduating in Trumpet, Music Didactis and Composition; for the latter discipline studying with M° C. Ballarini, G. Tosi and L. Francesconi. Subsequently, he obtained a Postgraduate Diploma in Composition at the Accademia Naz.le di S. Cecilia in Rome under the guidance of Franco Donatoni. In 1993 he won a scholarship for young composers announced by the S.I.A.E. (the Italian Authors and Publishers Society) and in 1995 he won 1st prize at the International Composition Competition "Valentino Bucchi" in Rome with a piece for string guartet.

This result, rather than motivating him, opens a period of "crisis," due to the extreme complexity his writing has reached, a complexity that he no longer feels represents him. Thus opens a phase in which, while maintaining "contemporary classical music" composition as his primary focus, his interest in jazz music and "alternative" musical expressions directs him toward the activity of the arranger and transcriber, for small and large ensembles. The many and varied collaborations result in a large body of work (arrangements, transcriptions and original compositions) for various ensembles, as well as a wide complex of collaborations ranging from contemporary music, jazz, and music for documentaries and jingles.

2014 marks the beginning of a new and fervent creative phase and a complete return to contemporary composition. Craftsmanship and the search for a modern yet expressive and communicative musical language are the hallmarks of his compositional style. He teaches composition at the Conservatory of Music 'Arrigo Boito' in Parma and, together with Caterina Calderoni, he is the author of the teaching texts *II basso imitato e fugato* and *La fuga*, both published by the publisher Ricordi, Milan.



Daniel Temkin, composer, is known for works filled with rich detail and visceral beauty. He has been Composer-in-Residence with Music from Angel Fire, Chamber Music Northwest, and the Intimacy of Creativity Festival in Hong Kong, receiving support from ACF, New Music USA, Amphion, the Aaron Copland Fund, Earshot, the Presser Foundation, and many others. Daniel's awards include the Indianapolis Symphony's Glick Prize, two BMI Composer Awards, and Honorable Mention as MTNA's Distinguished Composer of the Year.

Daniel's orchestra music has been heard worldwide, with performances by the Hong Kong Philharmonic, Indianapolis Symphony, Russia's St. Petersburg Chamber Philharmonic, Nashville Symphony, and the USC,

Curtis, Aspen, and Brevard orchestras. Daniel has also worked with leading chamber groups, including PRISM Quartet, Mirror Visions Ensemble, and members of Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, CMS II, Ensemble Connect, Astral Artists, and Young Concert Artists.

Daniel directs the series DTM Concerts, presenting recent music of living composers, and he has previously worked in artistic positions with Thornton EDGE and the Melos Music collective. Daniel's work has been heard on APM's Performance Today, PBS Philadelphia's WHYY, and recordings on the Naxos, Albany, and Navona labels.

Earning degrees from Rutgers (BM), NEC (MM), Curtis (AD), and USC (DMA), Daniel was a composition fellow at Aspen, Fontainebleau, and Brevard, as well as a percussionist at Aspen. He currently teaches as Assistant Professor of Music at Bucknell University.

Amelia Cannavo is a violinist from Barnegat Light, New Jersey and currently studies at the Cleveland Institute of Music with Jessica Lee. Before CIM, Amelia studied for seven years with J Freivogel. She also studied at Temple Music Prep Center for Gifted Young Musicians and at Settlement Music School's Advanced Study Ensemble Program. Most recently, she was chosen as a fellow at the Sarasota Music Festival, where she performed in several chamber groups and worked with Jasmine Choi and Robert Levin. She has participated in the Rebecca Penneys Piano Festival, the Chicago International Music Festival, and the Vivace International Music Festival. Over the course of her studies, she has played in masterclasses taught by Anne-Marie McDermott, Jeffrey Kahane, and Roberto Plano. Ashley is an active collaborative pianist at the Peabody Conservatory. Hudson Maness, viola | Elizabeth and Jay Lockman Fellowship Currently pursuing his master's degree with André Roy at McGill University's Schulich School of Music, Hudson received his bachelor's degree from the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University under Stephen Wyrczynski. In addition to performing in professional orchestras in Indiana, Kentucky, and Canada, Hudson has participated in the Texas Music Festival in Houston, the Trentino Music Festival in Italy, the Tanglewood Institute in Massachusetts, and the Montecito Music Festival in California. Hudson attends Garth Newel this summer as an Emerging Artist Fellow in the Lyra Quartet. Teaching is another of Hudson's primary passions. #### Steve Wogaman | Executive Director

Steve Wogaman joins Garth Newel as Executive Director in June 2024, following a national search. For the past 13, years he has served as President of Chamber Music Detroit (formerly the Chamber Music Society of Detroit), where he will continue to serve remotely as that organization's artistic director, bringing with him to Garth Newel a well-established national network of colleagues and contacts across the chamber music field. During the COVID-19 pandemic, he developed the CameraMusic webcasting platform, collaborating with over 70 peer organizations across North America while reaching an audience of more than 200,000 listeners worldwide.

Before moving to Michigan, Wogaman served as chief executive of the Canton Symphony Orchestra in Ohio and the Allentown Symphony Orchestra and its historic Symphony Hall in Pennsylvania. Steve was trained at the Eastman School of Music, the University of Louisville, and the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University, where he completed a Doctor of Music degree in piano performance under the Beaux Arts Trio's founding pianist, Menahem Pressler. At Indiana, his dissertation project involved the creation of a music education and outreach program that reached over one million students across rural Kentucky with live arts programs in their schools. As a prizewinner and finalist in several national piano and chamber music competitions, Wogaman has performed as soloist and chamber musician throughout the eastern and midwestern United States, as well as Spain and Central America. In the 1980s and 1990s he was founding pianist of the Whitney Trio, which played frequently in his native Washington, DC, including performances at the National Gallery of Art, Phillips Collection, and Alexandria Lyceum.

When not at a desk or on a piano bench, Steve Wogaman can often be found on the seat of a bicycle, occasionally participating in long-distance "randonneuring" rides of up to 250 miles in 24 hours.

#### Josh Elliott | Executive Chef

When enticing aromas waft from the kitchens of the Garth Newel Music Center, you know only one man can be behind it! Chef Josh Elliott has been working his magic at the Center since 2012, and the good eats just keep coming. Originally from Santa Cruz, California, Josh has been working in kitchens across the country since he was in high school. "I started washing dishes at age fourteen and just worked my way up through the kitchen, doing different things. When I was sixteen, I was starting to work the line, cooking and prepping. By eighteen, I was lead line cook."



With the encouragement of one of his high school teachers, Josh graduated from the California Culinary Academy in San Francisco before taking his first position as a pastry chef at the Stein Ericson Lodge in Deer Valley. Josh was recruited to staff the kitchen of the Homestead and worked under the extremely talented Pastry Chef Michel Finel, where he refined his art in pastry and spun sugar.

In early 2000, Josh had the opportunity to move back to Hot Springs, Virginia, where he opened his own restaurant, Elliott's. The place was wildly popular and led to other ventures in catering and event planning. Josh learned about Garth Newel from a longtime friend and fellow chef, Ed McArdle, and was eager to work his culinary magic at the Music Center. Through his tireless work and love of food, he has helped elevate the Music Center's gourmet meal offerings. Josh brought to the Center an extensive client list, and it is through his efforts, along with those of Georgia Tennant, the Director of Operations, that the Garth Newel Enterprise business has grown and become a huge supporter for the Music Center.

Known as the Fifth Member of the Garth Newel Piano Quartet, Josh's contributions enhance the Garth Newel experience where the magic of music, natural beauty, fine dining and lifelong friendships come together—much like his delectable creations, which combine a wide array of flavors and are made with love.



## Christine Herter Legacy Society

The Herter Society Legacy Program was established in 1981 to recognize those who have made future provisions for the Garth Newel Music Center in their estate plans, in any form or amount. Christine Herter Kendall, ever conscious of a long-standing family tradition of support to the arts, dreamed to one day establish a center for the study and performance of chamber music. In 1973 she, along with musicians Arlene and Luca Di Cecco, made that dream a reality.

In 1981, Christine died, bequeathing the property and a modest fund to the Di Ceccos for the purpose of establishing the Garth Newel Music Center Foundation, an endowment program for the continuing study and performance of chamber music.



For more than 25 years, Luca and Arlene Di Cecco devoted themselves to the development of the Center. In 1998, at their retirement, their vision (as well as that of Christine Herter Kendall) for the Garth Newel Music Center had become a reality.

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
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

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


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#### How to Get Here

- 200 miles southwest of Washington, DC




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
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





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
